

Productivity Losses vs. Outcome-Based Biases

Even while more businesses and organizations are adopting cloud-based project management software with the hope that this time will be different, genuinely vital information is still getting lost in the minutiae of emails, requests for information, and change orders.

The stakeholder interface and collaboration process are frequently overwhelmed by the exponential increase in megabytes and terabytes of data. After reviewing over 100 conflicts of varying sizes, a recurring element becomes apparent when the abundance of data is examined.

At the beginning of the project, users were highly motivated and focused on completing tasks and documenting their progress on the site every week. While numerous photographs are taken and uploaded into the cloud during the project, they usually have no annotation notes or explanation of their true meaning. The "causes & effects" of what is impacting the schedule are not effectively documented or retained for record-keeping since there is a naive expectation that things will improve next week or next month.

This "outcome-based bias" in data collection and analysis is similar to another historical period of erroneous reasoning known as "survivorship bias," which persisted in the early phases of the air campaign over Germany in World War II for the damaged aircraft that managed to return to the U.K. airfield bases.

The plane on the bottom left represents every location that needed more reinforcement to withstand enemy anti-aircraft fire or aerial combat encounters. That is, until the Hungarian statistics mathematician Abraham Wald, endowed with a counterintuitive insight, questioned the military's erroneous "survivorship bias" theory and developed the idea that the plane on the bottom right represents places that are susceptible and need extra protection. The take-away: No matter how uncomfortable the ensuing discussions or communication exchanges may be during project execution, one cannot overstate the significance of recording and documenting impact events in compliance with the necessary contract terms and conditions. Well labelled photographs can be highly effective compelling exhibits in delay claims and quantum litigation disputes.

Then, there is a chance to identify significant fixes grounded on a sound root cause analysis, which can help avoid the catastrophic error in thinking known as "outcomebased bias".
